

FIRE Seeds

By God's grace, we successfully organized a powerful *Fire Seed* event that brought together approximately 200 students from all five campuses where our ministry is active—SANU, EMCU, LUCT, BOTHO, and ECOT. The gathering was a vibrant expression of faith, unity, and purpose, as students from different institutions came together with one goal: to ignite their passion for Christ and be equipped to make a difference.

The event focused on prayer and intercession, with students lifting up pressing issues such as financial struggles, scholarship delays, suicidal thoughts, and gender-based violence. These heartfelt sessions reminded us all of the deep needs students face and the role faith plays in offering hope and healing.

A strong theme throughout the event was the importance of remaining rooted in Christ as a student. Attendees were grouped according to their institutions to discuss relevant topics like leadership development, student outreach, and how to contextualize ministry programs to fit diverse cultural environments.

One of the highlights was the interactive panel discussion, where experienced leaders tackled questions on overcoming ministry challenges, effective ways to evangelize, and leveraging social media to reach this digital generation with the Gospel.

The event was also filled with joy and connection—students shared testimonies, participated in games, and won prizes, fostering a deeper sense of belonging and shared mission. In a beautiful moment of response, around nine students boldly expressed their desire to step out and share the Gospel with their peers, stirred by the call to live out their faith more courageously.

The Fire Seed event was not just a gathering—it was a movement, a moment of divine ignition, planting seeds that we trust will bear much fruit in the lives of students and the future of campus ministry in Eswatini.

In January, SLM Eswatini had the great privilege of hosting a vibrant group of Korean students from the SLM department of Korea Campus Crusade for Christ (KCCC). This visit was a significant milestone in strengthening international partnerships, building community, and advancing our shared mission of spreading the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The purpose of the visit was not only cultural exchange but also spiritual alignment—encouraging one another through testimonies, ministry experiences, and meaningful fellowship.

Throughout their stay, the team visited several tertiary institutions where spiritual movements are active, including EMCU, LUCT, ECOT, BOTHO, and SANU. These visits were packed with prayer walks, evangelism, discipleship discussions, worship sessions, and open dialogue with students from Eswatini. The atmosphere in each visit was rich with excitement and spiritual hunger, and both the Korean students and the local ministry teams were mutually encouraged by each other's passion and boldness in the faith.

Our local teams—ECCC (Eswatini Campus Crusade for Christ) and the Korean team from KCCC—collaborated in evangelism outreaches on the campuses. Together, they shared their stories, led small group sessions, and

engaged students in personal conversations about faith. Language and cultural differences quickly faded as the Spirit of unity and purpose took over. The students from Korea were not only guests but also servants, humbling themselves to learn and serve wherever needed.

One highlight of the visit was a special combined outreach event held at EMCU, where over 100 students attended. The session included lively praise and worship, drama, a Gospel message, and time for prayer and interaction. Many students expressed renewed commitment to their spiritual growth and desire to be part of discipleship groups.

Beyond ministry work, the teams also enjoyed meals together, shared life stories, and learned from one another. The joy and warmth shared during this visit reminded us of the global nature of God's Kingdom and the beauty of unity across cultures.

This visit was more than a program—it was a powerful expression of family in Christ. The impact will remain not only in photos or memories, but in the lasting relationships, shared visions, and the fire that was reignited for campus revival. As ECCC, we are grateful and look forward to deeper collaborations in the future.

The SLM team successfully hosted SLM CAMP 2025, bringing together 34 students from various institutions such as ECOT, Kwaluseni, Botho, SANU, Wesco, Limkokwing, and EMCU. The purpose of the camp was to equip student leaders with the knowledge and skills required to lead and grow the SLM movement on their respective campuses. Participants learned not only how to do ministry but also how to raise resources and collaborate with Campus Crusade for Christ (CCC) staff to ensure the sustainability and growth of their efforts.

The camp provided training in various evangelism tools, including The Four and follow-up discipleship strategies. One key focus was on equipping the students to disciple others and raise multiplying disciples. Asked about discipleship EMCU student, Simon, who is a disciple of Timm, spoke on how persistent Timm was in following up with him which has inspired him to want to disciple others too.

A significant part of the camp involved planning how each campus would begin its own movement. Students were asked to devise strategies for reaching their peers, creating a sense of ownership and responsibility for the mission. In addition to strategic planning, the camp incorporated moments of intense prayer and meditation. Students were encouraged to engage in “quiet times” to reflect on their spiritual journey, with a practical exercise where they read and reflected on the book of Jonah in just 10 minutes.

By the end of the camp, students were empowered and motivated to take on leadership roles, confident in their ability to lead and multiply disciples on their campuses, ensuring the continued growth and impact of the SLM movement.

"I believe that I can do better in discipling others also as I have seen it being modelled to me by sis Nokulunga" - She said.

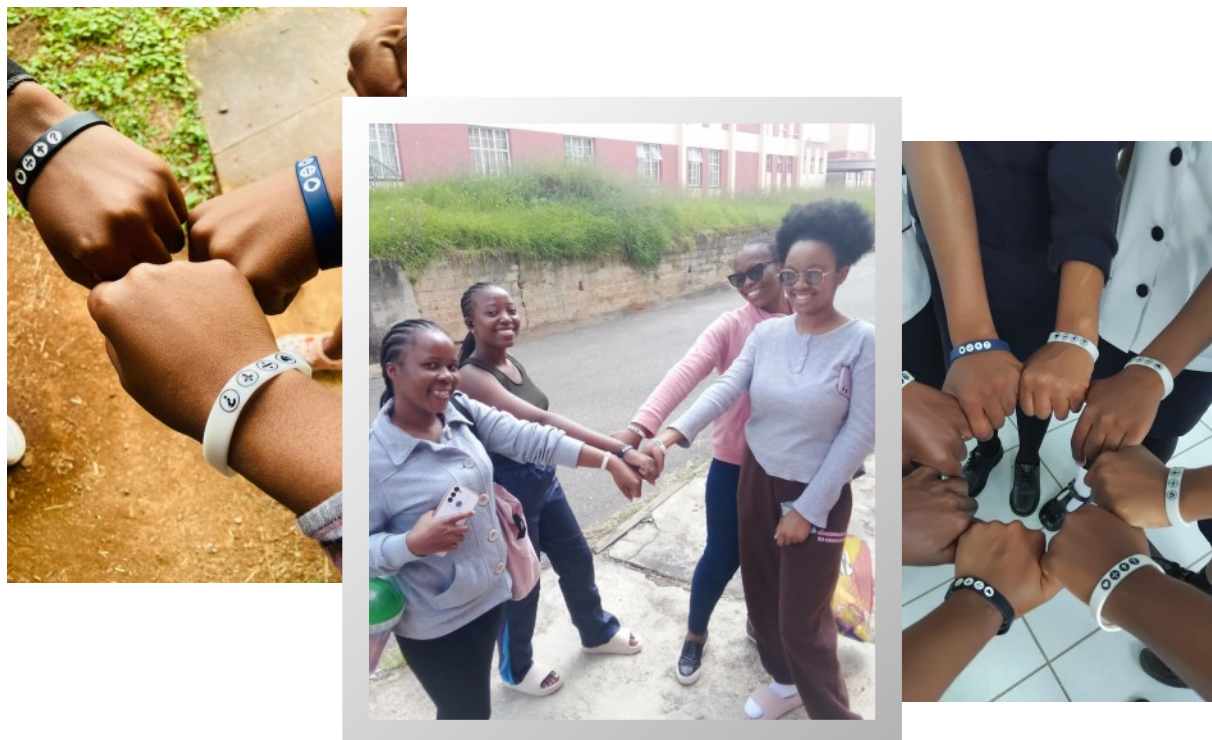
BELIEVING GOD FOR MORE

AFTER THE CAMP

There's a fresh wave of boldness sweeping through campuses. Since returning from the SLM Camp 2025, student leaders have stepped out with new passion and direction. Many have begun sharing the gospel using *The Four*, the evangelism tool introduced during the camp. It's more than just talk—students are responding. Several have already made the decision to follow Christ through these personal and heartfelt conversations.

What's even more encouraging is that the momentum didn't end at conversion. Across campuses, follow-up has begun. Student leaders are intentionally checking in, meeting up, and guiding new believers in their faith journey. The call to make multiplying disciples is being answered—not as a concept, but as a real commitment.

Among the campuses, SANU and ECOT are emerging as front-runners. Their consistency in outreach, follow-up, and mobilization is inspiring others and setting a clear pace for what's possible.

Each campus had a strategy session during the camp, and it's clear that the decisions made there are now turning into action. CAMP 2025 wasn't just an event—it was a launchpad. What we're seeing now is the beginning of something greater: students taking ownership, stepping out in faith, and lighting sparks of transformation in their schools.

STUDY WITH SUCCESS

Throughout the first quarter of 2025, the Study with Success (SWS) program has proven to be a powerful platform for both academic and spiritual transformation among students across the country. From January to March, the SLM team successfully hosted 6 seminars, reaching over 860 students with practical tools for academic success and the life-changing message of the Gospel.

The journey began at Redeemed Church, where a youth camp provided the perfect setting to impact 200 young people, with 30 giving their lives to Christ. This long-standing partnership between the church and CCC continues to bear fruit in equipping the next generation.

In February, the team visited Beaconcorp and Othandweni Primary, training 50 students and witnessing 13 decisions for Christ. At Othandweni High, an impressive 215 students participated, and 65 responded to the call of salvation.

Enhlanganisweni High School followed, with 80 students trained and 35 accepting Christ. Then came Lidwala High School, where 72 students were trained, and 14 surrendered their lives to Jesus. The partnership with the school's Scripture Union will help ensure continued support and discipleship for the new believers.

Finally, in March, the team concluded the quarter at Holy Rosary High, where 200 students from Form 3, 4, and 5 were trained, and 23 students prayed to receive Christ.

These numbers, while encouraging, reflect something far greater than statistics—they reflect stories of hope, redemption, and a renewed vision for life. Each seminar was more than an event; it was a divine appointment. The seeds sown during these sessions will continue to grow and bear fruit in the hearts of the students.

BUILDING SUPPORT NETWORKS AND MINISTRY PARTNERSHIPS

As part of our support-raising efforts, we have been connecting with local churches to build strong ministry partnerships. In January, we met with the United Pentecostal Church. While their response was a "no," the opportunity to share our vision was a valuable lesson in resilience.

February, however, brought greater opportunities. On February 19, we met with Pastor Nhleko from Assemblies of God. To our surprise, we were welcomed by the national board, and in just 10 minutes, they were captivated by our ministry. As a result, we have been invited to share our vision at their upcoming pastors' fellowship on March 21, where we will have the opportunity to reach church leaders from all regions of Eswatini.

On February 20, we met with Reverend Msane from the Evangelical Church in Ezulwini. He expressed a keen interest in partnership and invited us to train his church in evangelism and discipleship. Additionally, he hopes we can assist their Bible School students with practical discipleship training.

We also had a meaningful meeting with Pastor Jude from Jesus Calls Worship Centre. He encouraged us to challenge churches with our projects and explore new ways to collaborate.

It has been an exciting season of building relationships with influential leaders and expanding ministry opportunities, and we are eager to see how God will continue to open doors.

A New Beginning

Apostolic Faith Church, one of Eswatini's traditional churches, has experienced significant challenges after a split due to leadership disagreements, leaving just six branches. However, they invited us to help renew their commitment to their mission. During a training session, young leaders were empowered to take responsibility for their community and grow disciples. The youth leader, Mr. Matsebula, expressed interest in further training with our MC2 program.

Glimpse of Hope

During a community gathering in Malindza, Nelisiwe Zulu, a GCM staff member, met Mrs. Motsa, a woman carrying a deep burden. After talking, Nelisiwe offered practical help, including assisting with laundry to support Mrs. Motsa's family. On February 17, Nelisiwe shared the story of the Good Shepherd with her from 1 John 10:22-30. Mrs. Motsa was moved, finding peace in the message of eternal life, despite her struggles. This experience reminded us of the power of God's grace and the fulfilment of sharing His love.

REFLECTIONS

Manila, Philippines 2 -6 December 2024

I thank God for the provision and protection as I continue with Master's degree course in Transformational Leadership under Global Academy for Transformational Leadership (GATL). Last year we attended another training at Philippines where we learnt a lot on Developing Leaders Strategies and Processes. Below are some of my reflections from the training.

The first class focused on developing leaders and understanding the vision behind its establishment. Dr. Bekele shared four key motivations for leadership development: Self-Interest, Success, Sustainability, and Significance. One of the most impactful lessons was that when we grow others, we grow ourselves. Leadership is not just about personal ambition but about multiplying others for lasting transformation.

A powerful analogy from Bill Hodgson resonated with me:

"If you want to feed a family, grow a garden. If you want to feed a community, grow a farm. But if you want to feed a nation, raise farmers."

This underscores the importance of investing in leaders who will, in turn, develop others and bring national transformation.

One of the key barriers to leadership development we discussed was the "fear of handing over power." Many leaders struggle to raise successors due to insecurity or lack of vision for the next generation. This challenged me to reflect on the leaders I am intentionally developing.

I have started making a list, beginning with my children, my team members in Global Church Movements (GCM), and my disciples at church.

This will definitely help me to be intentional in raising leaders and not just followers in every sphere of influence that God positions me.

Lessons from History and Ministry Best Practices

Dr. Bekele also reminded us of painful historical events—the killing fields of Cambodia, the Rwandan Genocide, and the slave embarkation sites in West Africa. These tragedies highlight how leadership has often failed, and how leaders today must learn from the past to build a better future.

Christ Commission Fellowship

We later visited the Christ Commission Fellowship (CCF), a church with a vision to make Christ committed followers who raise other Christ centred and committed followers.

Their model has led to the planting of thousands of small groups and satellite churches. I was inspired by how they reach people from all walks of life—the rich, the poor, and members of marginalized communities.

Their simplicity in using the Bible as the main tool for discipleship reminded me that effective ministry does not require complex methods

Peter (Senior pastor) shared valuable lessons to us on what keeps them afloat, saying it is vital to stay true to the gospel (2 Timothy 2:1), avoid worldly entanglements and to work hard.

This visit gave me insight into what needs to be done in the churches of Eswatini. Many of our pastors envy the megachurch model, but the CCF approach—which combines evangelism, discipleship, and community impact—could be a game-changer. I pray that God may use me to help multiply churches effectively in Eswatini.

The Cru Family

We also attended the Cru Philippines Christmas party, and it was a joy to witness Cru staff dancing with their children and playing games together. Over time, I have observed how the Cru has become a fully fledged family by organizing family focused activities that contribute to the organization's long term growth and unity.

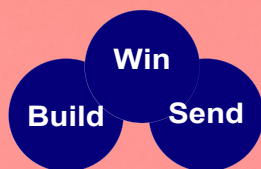
Lead By Following

Vision Casting

As part of the ongoing Africa Women Leaders Initiative, our team has embarked on a series of vision casting visits to various churches and communities in the country.

These visits were aimed at introducing the vision and mission of the Women Initiative. The visits took place at different churches including Hawane Christian Life Center on 11th February, Manzini Full Gospel Church on February 26th, and Mafutseni AEC on 15th March 2025.

At each location, the team was warmly received. At Manzini Full Gospel Church, a monthly interdenominational service led by Pastor S Dlodlu, the women responded positively to the vision casting. We invited them to our upcoming all-night prayer event, which resulted in connecting with more women from the Shiselweni region. Similarly, during our visit to the Hawane Christian Life Center, a weekly service led by Pastor Chazile Makhanya, the team shared the vision and also extended an invitation to the prayer event. Pastor Chazile expressed interest in having us speak at a larger conference later in the year, as well as offering training on soul-winning.

Our visit to Mafutseni AEC in March involved screening a Jesus Film segment focusing on The Samaritan Woman, which resonated deeply with the 27 women in attendance, including the Pastor and the Chief's wife. The segment highlighted the importance of making disciples, and a powerful prayer session followed. The women showed great interest in the message, and the team was invited to share the Great Commission mandate at another church in the future.

Overall, the vision casting visits were impactful, leading to meaningful connections, invitations for future collaboration, and excitement for the upcoming prayer event, as the Women's Initiative continues to empower and uplift women across Eswatini.

Jesus Film Shows

The Women's Initiative team held impactful outreach events, starting with Fonteyn Evangelical Church on 26 January 2025, where 60 children attended a screening of the *Jesus Film*. The event included praise and worship, followed by an interactive discussion and prayer, strengthening the church-community relationship.

On 28th February 2026, 36 young people attended an outreach event at Growing Faith Ministries in Lobamba. After watching the film, 16 young people committed their lives to Christ, and follow-up sessions were arranged with the Pastor.

On 15th March 2025, 27 women gathered at Mafutseni AEC for a screening of the Samaritan woman segment. The women were inspired to make disciples, and a prayer session was held for a sick relative of one of the attendees.

These events have been a powerful testament to the outreach and life-changing impact of the Jesus Film, as it continues to lead individuals to give their lives to Christ and discipleship across different communities.

The Women Initiative team is grateful for the opportunities to serve, witness God's work in transforming lives and strengthening spiritual connections. Through these efforts, the Women's Ministry team has helped to empower and encourage both individuals and communities to grow in faith, with a lasting impact on their spiritual journeys.

SAS Seminars

Success at School (SAS) continues to change lives in Eswatini, empowering students both academically and spiritually.

On 25 February 2025, the Women's Ministry team visited Malkerns Valley Primary School, engaging 371 students from grades 1 to 7. Topics such as Being Proactive, Exam Preparation, Goal-Setting, and Defining Priorities were covered, with students showing great excitement and involvement. This was the team's second visit, following noticeable academic improvement after their first visit in 2024. The principal invited the team back, and students like Nosipho Dlamini shared how setting SMARTER goals helped them improve their grades. The team looks forward to more success stories from Malkerns Valley.

On March 6th 2025, the team visited Mdzimba High School in the Hhohho region, where they taught Form 4 and 5 students. Similar topics were covered, and the students showed strong interest. The students showed a lot of interest in the

Success at School program and being mentored in their newly found faith.

After the event, two groups of students who accepted Christ were formed, and a follow-up meeting was a great success in fostering spiritual growth.

On 21 March 2025, the team visited St. Francis High School, where 176 students from grades 8A to 8D participated in the sessions. The team covered the Pareto Principle in addition to the other topics. St. Francis already has a Scripture Union, which allowed for deeper spiritual engagement. The students were eager for the training, and the team is hopeful for continued academic and spiritual improvement at the school.

These outreach events demonstrate the ongoing impact of SAS in transforming students' lives. The team remains committed to equipping young people with the tools they need for academic success and spiritual growth, looking forward to continued positive results in these communities.

When we visited Malkerns Valley Primary this year, we were so excited to learn that the topics we teach engrave into the minds of students.

Mrs Gugu Shongwe had just finished facilitating her topic Being Proactive when Zamo approached her and asked;

“When are you going to teach us about setting goals?” Gugu was surprised and asked if she remembered the topic from the previous year. Zamo nodded confidently and shared how much that teaching had impacted her. She said, “Last year, you taught us about setting SMARTER goals. My goal was to get at least 80% pass rate, and I was able to achieve that.”

Her words were sincere and inspiring. In that conversation, Zamo showed that she had not only listened but had applied what she learned—and it worked.

And the beautiful part is that she is not alone. Others also approached Mrs. Thuli Kaledi who was doing the topic and explained how it helped them too.

These moments remind us that Success at School is more than just a program—it’s a movement shaping the way students think, plan, and believe in themselves. The feedback we continue to receive from schools proves that the seeds planted are growing—one student, one goal, one breakthrough at a time.

THERE IS AN EXCEPTION

We were shocked to learn that some schools in Eswatini—despite being a Christian country—do not have any active Christian movements or fellowships. During one of our Success at School visits this year, we discovered that the school had no Scripture Union, prayer meetings, or platform for spiritual development. This was both surprising and concerning, considering the importance of nurturing not just the mind, but also the spirit of young people.

Ironically, our team was welcomed with warmth and openness by both the teachers and students. It was clear that the spiritual hunger was there, even if the structure wasn’t.

As we ministered and shared the message of hope, love, and purpose through Jesus Christ, hearts were stirred. By the end of the session, at least 78 students boldly prayed to receive Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior.

The response was overwhelming—and beautiful. One of the teachers approached us afterward and requested help to start a Christian movement in the school. That moment reminded us why we do what we do. The harvest is truly ripe. All it takes is someone to go, to speak, and to love. SAS is stepping in to fill that gap.

Women Ministry's **ALL NIGHT PRAYER**

Under the cover of night, as the rain gently fell, 74 women gathered from all corners of the country to unite in prayer, igniting a powerful wave of faith and devotion at the All Night Prayer hosted by the Women's Ministry on 28th March 2025. Despite the downpour, the women's unwavering commitment to seek God's presence was evident, as they gathered from all four regions to be part of this life-changing event.

The night of prayer was the climax of a month-long spiritual journey that began on 1st March with a seven-day prayer and fasting period. This was followed by a dedication to praying twice daily—morning and evening—for the entire month, cultivating a strong foundation of prayer and unity. By the time the prayer night arrived, the women were ready, spiritually prepared, and expectant for a move of God.

One of the primary goals of the night was to strengthen the Women Initiative in the country, building relationships with women leaders and fostering opportunities for church partnerships. Make Khawulile Khanyile has already opened doors in her community, with five churches expressing interest in partnering with the Women's Ministry.

With daily morning and evening prayers continuing, the momentum from this prayer night has continued to grow, strengthening the women's faith and their commitment to the Word of God.

The reception of this event is a clear testimony that it came at the perfect time for our country. The eagerness, unity, and faith demonstrated by the women are proof that God is ready to spark spiritual movements everywhere until everyone knows someone who truly follows Christ.



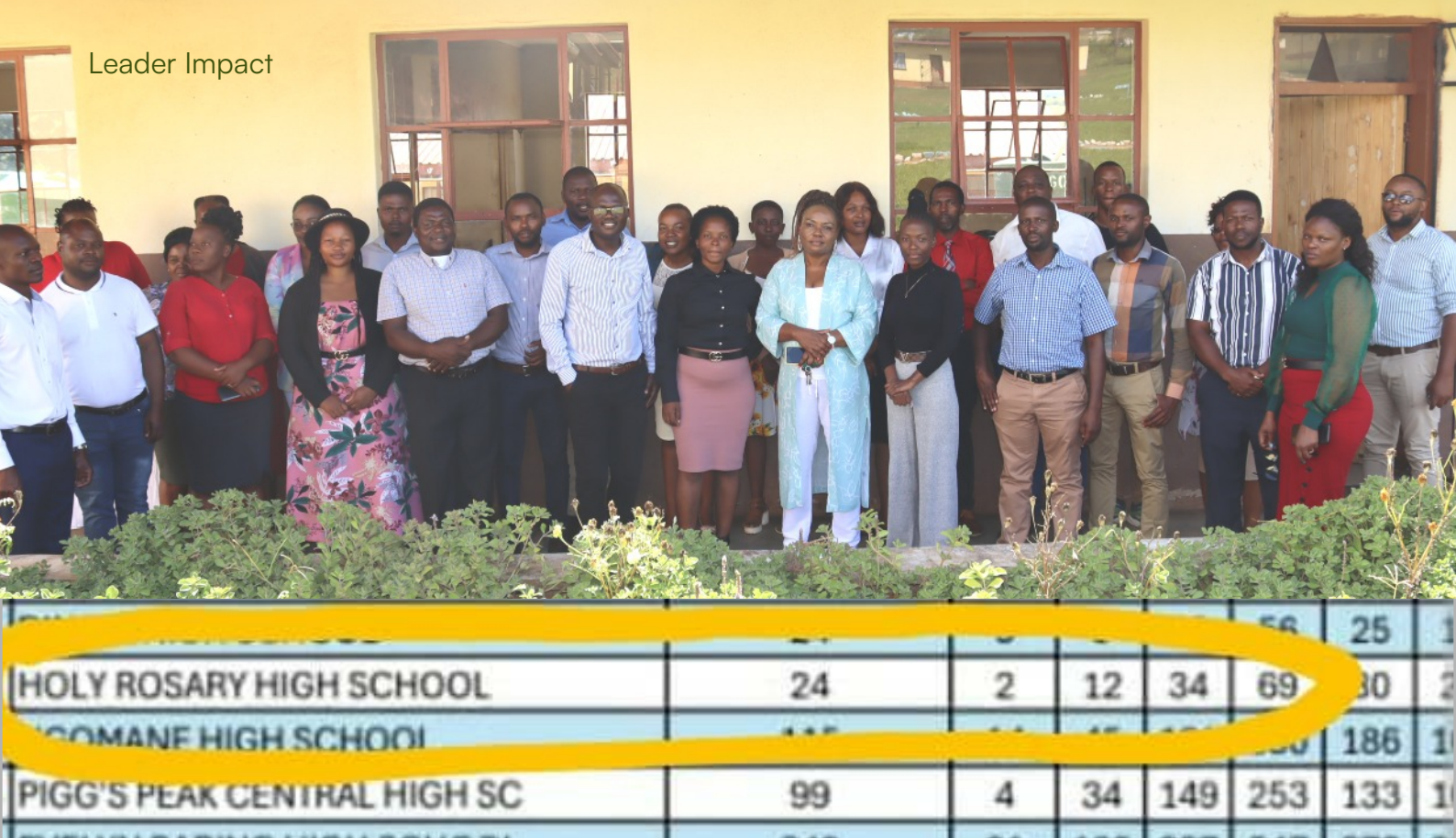

SAS TRAINED SCHOOL MAKES IT TO TOP 10

It started with a simple invitation. Walking through the streets of Mtsambama, we lifted a megaphone and let the message ring out—an open call to come and watch **The Jesus Film.** Some listened from a distance, some ignored it, but as evening approached, nearly 40 people gathered at a small grocery shop, drawn by something greater than curiosity.

As the film played, the atmosphere shifted. The words of Jesus, the scenes of His love, His sacrifice—it all felt personal. Hearts softened, minds reflected, and for one man, the weight of his struggles became too heavy to carry alone.

Many prayed to receive Christ that night, including one man who openly expressed his desire to surrender his life to Jesus and break free from alcohol.

"I don't want this thing anymore. I know the right thing to do, but I just can't."

It was an honest cry, one that only God could answer. We prayed with him, trusting that the same Jesus he had just seen on screen was more than a story—He was a Savior, present and powerful.

Now, the real work begins. Seeds have been planted, but they need to be nurtured. We are praying for the resources to do follow-ups, using the **Walking with Jesus** film series to help those who made commitments grow in their faith.

That night in Mtsambama, it wasn't a megaphone, a film, or even our voices that moved hearts—it was God Himself. And when He calls, people respond.

We are also deeply grateful for the overwhelming support from the community, especially the shop owner, who not only allowed us to use his space but also expressed his willingness to support future initiatives. *"This is God's work,"* he said. And truly, it was.

I'm deeply grateful for the opportunity to attend the Africa Resources Team gathering in Tanzania. Being among nations nearing Stage 3 status was both humbling and inspiring.
